Comments on the Proposed Safety Bylaw

The proposed safety bylaw is in no way anti-hunting or hunters. It is recognized that most hunters are courteous and respectful of landowners and obey the hunting rules. The hunters causing the adverse situations with many town residents are usually from elsewhere.

This situation is resulting in a lot of animosity and feelings of usurped power from many residents. Most people who live in Leyden are here because they love and enjoy the rural setting and desire to be able to live, work, and walk on their land with a feeling of safety.

Leyden is historically and foremost an agricultural-based town, as evidenced by our zoning bylaws. Whatever level of agriculture one is involved in, it is necessary to know that you, your children, and your animals are safe, whether you're plowing, haying, gardening, climbing a tree or hanging out your laundry. (Remember the woman in Maine who was shot while hanging out her laundry because a hunter thought she was a deer?) It is increasingly difficult to feel safe when there are mounting evidences of incidences with hunters.

One would hope that the posting of one's land would seem like a viable option, but let's take a look at it. Firstly, there's the expense of all the signs, nails, etc. Then there's the amount of time involved in putting the signs up, and it has to be done annually. There are hunters who totally ignore the signs, tear them down, or vow that they never saw them. Many landowners are older and have impaired mobility, which makes posting difficult. Also, maybe you don't want to ban everyone from your property.

Here are a few stories of incidents on posted land:

A grandmother and granddaughter were sitting on their porch. There was a shot heard and then a bullet whizzed between them and lodged into the wall of the house. When confronted the hunter claimed he'd been hunting on that land for 40 years and we wasn't going to change. Keep in mind that posted or non-posted it is illegal to hunt within 500 feet of buildings.

>Two horseback riders were riding on their posted land and came upon a hunter. The hunter had the arrogance to ask them

to be quiet as his friend had a deer in his sights.

A landowner with posted land had to escort the same hunter off his land for several years in a row. Then the hunter proceeded to harass the landowner.

Another landowner had his land posted, and the owner was hunting on his own land. A deer appeared and was in his sights when a hunter, ignoring the posted signs, shot the deer right in front of him.

What we can conclude from this sampling of incidents around town is that *posting one's land does not keep hunters off of it.* Remember the adage, "Locked doors only keep honest people out." Well, it seems posted land only keeps honest hunters out. If hunters cannot or will not police themselves, then homeowners must take a proactive stance and do what they deem necessary. In this day and age it is a wise idea, and an inherent right, to know who's walking around on your land with loaded guns, and it's your choice if you even want them there or who you will allow there.

How are other towns handling this? Upon investigation it was discovered that at least 80 towns in Massachusetts already have the bylaw that you must get written permission from a landowner to hunt on his or her property. Another 80 have some sort of restriction and some outright bans. Also, 22 states in our country have written permission as a statewide requirement. Whether or not to allow hunters (or anyone) on your land should be a right of ownership, and not the right of someone else just because they have a hunting license.

Where can hunters hunt? There are approximately 1,500 acres of public land in Leyden, of which more than half is owned by Massachusetts Fish and Game. This area is unrestricted for hunting. There are several hunting landowners in town who own large tracts of land and more than likely would continue to allow hunters to hunt. That is now approximately 3,000 acres. How many acres are enough? Surely many landowners will grant permission to hunters that they know and who are respectful of the privilege. And it is a privilege, not a right, afforded to them.

Veterans at Pearl Rhodes

Pearl Rhodes Elementary School students learned why they're having a three-day weekend by meeting eight Leyden veterans during a Thursday assembly.

In honor of Veterans Day, Bob Clancy, principal of both Pearl Rhodes and Bernardston Elementary School, arranged for local Vietnam and Afghanistan veterans to come to the school and answer questions about their service.

The veterans involved were Bob Hardesty, William Glabach, Lance Fritz, Jeffrey Neipp, Aimee Rackham, Bob Snow, Matt Muka and Charlie Loven.

Clancy, a Vietnam veteran himself, said he regularly schedules an assembly about Veterans Day at Bernardston Elementary, and wanted to bring the same to Pearl Rhodes to give students "a sense of understanding of what a veteran is and who they are in their own community."

After saying the Pledge of Allegiance, students watched a video about the history of Veterans Day. First- and second-graders sang the eight veterans a song they rehearsed, and presented them with cards. Following questions that touched on what the veterans ate during the war and whether they were injured, students shook the veterans' hands.

Lisa Armstrong, who teaches fifth and sixth grades, said she hopes her students gain an understanding that serving the country is a sacrifice, and said the assembly tied in well with her students' recent readings. For sixth-grader Marshall Deveney, the assembly reminded him of his own family.

"I do have a lot of veterans in my family," he said.

The assembly was also a useful experience for the veterans, allowing them to connect with each other.

"I didn't know there were that many of them in town," said Loven, who served in the Air Force from 1966 to 1970.

Before the assembly ended, Clancy gave students a simple piece of advice.

"It is very likely that in your family, or in your neighborhood, you know veterans," Clancy said. "So what you should do when you see them is just say 'Thank you."

WiredWest was formed to bring broadband to all hill towns. The recent promise of more state aid makes it likely that network construction can be completed. The focus now turns to preparing to operate the network. WiredWest is working on details of a network operation contract with WG&E (Westfield Gas and Electric) to be signed by the end of the year. Economic analysis shows that most small towns can't afford to operate stand-alone networks but that a regional network is viable.

WiredWest is now asking towns to sign a Memorandum of Understanding, indicating interest in being part of the regional network. The price WG&E will charge for data connections will depend upon the number of potential customers each town can offer. WG&E also has experience with administrative services that small towns are not ready to provide. Together, all towns can be connected. This was the original goal and is still the focus of WiredWest.






