The Robertson Memorial Library received an early Christmas gift of \$2,100 as our share of the distribution of the Durkin Bequest. Because the Western Mass. Regional Library System has been absorbed into the Mass. Library System, this money, originally intended for the purchase of books and CDs by the WMRLS for use by all libraries in western Massachusetts via bookmobile, has been divvied up and shared with all of our towns. I will be able to purchase books and CDs for Leyden with this money.

The grant for which I applied to the Foundation for Educational Excellence has been awarded. In coordination with the principal and teachers at Pearl Rhodes, author Liza Ketchum will visit the elementary school in April or May to share her expertise as a writer, researcher, and teacher with students in all grades. Each of the three classes (1/2, 3/4 and 5/6) will read a grade-appropriate novel by the author and be prepared to share ideas, ask questions and actually do some writing themselves with the author. I'm working on the curriculum for each book now and will be sharing it with teachers for their input soon.

## **Municipal Lighting Plant**

Is there anyone in Leyden who can imagine life without electricity? Running water? Telephones? In a very short time, believe it or not, we will *all* be saying that about internet connection, even if you think you would never use a computer. Do you want your home to go up in value? Do you like to think of all the small businesses operating out of people's homes here in Leyden? Can you ever foresee being able to have routine medical testing - blood sugar, blood pressure, etc., done from your phone? Do you like having terrible phone lines? No chance for cable TV? If you are already using a computer, and stuck with dial-up, think about it: most of us are too old to waste all that time waiting to get information! It is hard to believe that most of western Massachusetts is behind the curve on this, but indeed it is!

The Special Town Meeting which is scheduled for <u>Thursday</u>, January 6<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM is a first big step in bringing to Leyden the best option anyone can imagine, fiber optic on a large scale, right to the door of anyone who wants it. It has been determined that forming a Municipal Lighting Plant is the quickest, most efficient, tried and tested way to do this for our hodgepodge network of small towns. What we are voting on at this point is really just a legal entity—no building, no employees, nothing to maintain. It will, however, allow us to join with other towns to form a co-op, which would then become the working arm of that entity, to do the work of raising funds, and completing the last mile to our homes. It puts no one under any pressure to opt for fiber optic to their homes. It just allows our towns to have the best means of becoming connected, of enhancing home values, improving police and safety communications, and of looking to the future in every sense. There is no going back to life without computers; the move is always forward.

There will be several people at Town Hall a half hour before the Special Town Meeting for those who want a bit more information. We will even offer cookies and coffee as an incentive to come. We hope to see a good turnout. This is the next big frontier for all of us. It is exciting to be in on it from the beginning. Let's all be part of this generation's Rural Electrification Program.

## **Standby Generator Program**

The Leyden Police Department and the Emergency Operation Agency, in partnership with Vermont Yankee has started a standby generator program which consists of two phases.

*Phase I* will provide generators for the Town Hall, Highway, Fire and Police Departments, Leyden Methodist Church, and Peal Rhodes Elementary School. The Town Hall and church will serve as emergency shelters, providing for overnight accommodations, hot meals and showers. The second part of Phase I will be the availability of several standby generators configured in 120 volt only. These will be provided during times of power outages on a first come first serve basis, with priorities given to medical conditions, elderly, and farms with producing livestock.

*Phase II* will consist of supplying generators able to supply power to an entire household. The town will be broken into zones, such as the west end of River Road, the north end of East Hill Road, Kately Hill/Stephen Lane area, etc. The houses selected for this program must be willing to make their homes open to their neighbors in times of emergencies for necessity such as water and sanitary facilities. The second part of Phase II will supply standby generators for properly wired homes as they are available.
