### What Leyden is Reading

Like our little library, the National Woman's Party was founded in 1913. The focus of this organization was the passage of a constitutional amendment for woman's suffrage. On the eve of Woodrow Wilson's inauguration in March, a woman's suffrage parade consisting of 5,000 people was attacked by a mob. Hundreds of women were injured, but no arrests were made. Hmmm—why might this be? It wasn't until 1920 that women won the constitutional right to vote. What lesson might one learn from this effort?

It was well before 1913 that many women started working for change. Children's books offer a quick, fun way to get a brief insight into what was brewing. We have a couple of options for a discussion around the dinner table. The first is "Bloomers" by Rhonda Blumberg (talk about a fashion statement), and the second comes from "Lives of Extraordinary Women: Rulers, Rebels (and What the Neighbors Thought)". Read the selection on Jeannette Rankin. She won a seat in the U.S. Congress before all the women in this country had the right to vote!

Copies of these books are available at the library and at PRES. Remember to support your library. We citizens must be informed in order to make wise choices, and reading is a great venue to reach this goal!

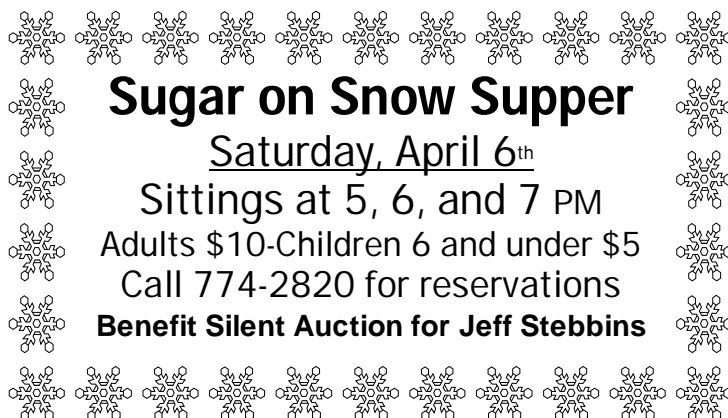

Lois Feldman saved the day; she 'womanned' the desk while I raced to the town hall to pay bills and collect the mail. At six o'clock I closed the library and posted the furnace news to alert patrons that the library would be closed until further notice. What an eventful day!

Due to the hard work and research of Trustee Chair Carolyn Asbury, a new furnace was installed by Tognarelli Plumbing Company, and the library re-opened on Wednesday, February 6<sup>th</sup>. We are back in business!

## WiredWest

It looks as though the first big step toward getting the best fiber optic Wi-Fi into Leyden may be completed by April or May. Mass. Broadband, which laid all the cable two years ago along 91 from Springfield north will be bringing the lines into many of our towns' anchor institutions—town halls, schools, libraries, and fire and police departments. I am not sure yet if all of ours will be connected with this first hook-up, but since they are in such a straight line, they may well be. There will be a "go live" date after that, but Leyden is among the second group to be connected. Weather, of course, may put a bit of a crimp in those plans, but not by much. After that, those lines will become the connecting point from which WiredWest will do the last mile to our homes. That, of course, is down the line by at least a year or two, since we still have to raise lots of money from potential investors. And speaking of that, once again, I am so grateful that so many of you have filled out the support cards and continue to do so! The response from Leyden has been amazing. It is exciting each week to check the report to see that people are still filling out the form online at wiredwest.net. ## Library Patrons Beware !

An Act for the Preservation of Books and Other property belonging to Public Libraries

[Acts of 1872 chapter 42 incorporated in Public Statutes chapter 203 section 79]

*Be it enacted, etc., as follows :*

Section 1. Whoever willfully and maliciously or wantonly and without cause writes upon, injures, defaces, tears or destroys any book, plate, picture, engraving or statue, belonging to any law, town, city or other public library, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the jail not exceeding six months for every such offence.

### Music News



Students from all grades have been engaged in a variety of music activities. In Pre-K/K, students continue to build their repertoire and develop good pitch and quality to their voices. We've enjoyed singing "BINGO", "This Little Light of Mine" and "Ten Little Children in the Band". The pieces help students develop timing, creative verse-building and counting. In addition, Pre-K/K students seem to *love* pantomiming the movement and expression of animals big and small as the piano is played. The tunes and style help inspire creative and individual expression.

In Grades 1/2, students are looking forward to using small, percussive instruments for accompaniment to songs that have strong rhythmic patterns. In addition, students will learn traditional dances and singing games that help forge cooperation and community-building; reinforce rhythmic patterns and creative expression and develop a repertoire of well-known songs, while also offering the opportunity for fun and enjoyment! Stay tuned.

Students in the upper grades just completed a unit that involved the wonderful book, "The Legend of Blue Bonnet" by author, Tomie DePaola. They were assigned characters from the story, while also using a variety of percussive instruments such as drums, rain-sticks, gongs and chimes to create sound effects as the story was read aloud. Students developed their ability to play effectively, recite lines with expression, and observe cues. In addition, the unit offered great fun and the opportunity for collaboration and team work. We look forward to more theater and stories as the year goes on. —Mrs. Spiro-Abedon



Local Emergency planners are reminding residents that every winter cold, ice, and storms come to western Massachusetts and preparing for these inevitable events can make the impact much less severe for you, your family, and your pets. Lindsey Britt, Regional Preparedness Planner at the Franklin Regional Council of Governments, suggests keeping several days of food (that does not require cooking) in your home and storing five gallons of water per person in case your pipes freeze or burst. Having a battery powered radio is also very helpful during power outages, because many town officials and emergency responders will communicate important information, such as the location of warming centers, through local radio stations.

Ms. Britt notes that "Franklin County residents have already experienced very cold temperatures in 2013, which increases the risk of water disruption, and during extreme winter weather events the chance of fire and carbon monoxide poisoning also increases." Many of these tragedies can be prevented by checking the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, by having a multi-purpose, dry-chemical fire extinguisher in the home, and by ensuring furnace vents are clear of snow so they can properly discharge.

During emergencies that cause disruption to utility service it can be particularly tempting to use generators, grills, gas camping stoves, and other similar devices inside the home, but Ms. Britt cautions that "generators or any gas-powered engines should never be run inside the basement, garage, or other enclosed structure—even if the doors and windows are open—unless the equipment is professionally installed and vented, because improper use can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning and possibly death." The same risks apply to using a gas range and oven to heat the home.

If you have already prepared yourself and your home, Ms. Britt suggests reaching out to neighbors and family members who may need help protecting themselves. "It is much easier to prepare than to react during a crisis when supplies are difficult to locate, traveling may be impossible, and emergency services can be stretched thin. You can also encourage your neighbors to visit [www.westemmassready.org](http://www.westemmassready.org), which has a wealth of preparedness information," says Ms. Britt.
