## **Fire Department**

Due to recent changes in Federal regulations, and to questions about inspections in general, a correction to my previous article is required. Because of recent changes to Federal regulations, propane companies now send a letter to the Leyden Fire Department if any changes to a propane tank or contract occur. This makes the Fire Department's record-keeping easier and requires inspections only when a new tank is set, a new vendor takes over or a tank becomes customer-owned. Any other propane tank inspections will be done as requested by the resident and/or as-needed basis.

The Building Inspector provides inspections for new outdoor or indoor wood-burning stoves which require permits to install. Wood stoves are only inspected by the Fire Department when there is a problem, e.g.. a chimney fire. If anyone has any questions feel free to give me a call at (413) 824 8683 or call the Fire Station at (413) 773 7673 and leave a message.

## **WiredWest**

#### Why WiredWest is Asking our Member Towns to Pay a \$1,000 Fee for FY 2015

Since our formation almost three years ago, WiredWest has worked diligently on behalf of our member towns to bring "last mile" fiber-optics broadband to your residents and businesses. We are now at a pivotal point in that project, actively pursuing financing opportunities, and we need your continued support.

We are an all-volunteer organization comprised of a Board of Directors, with one delegate from each town; an Executive Committee of nine members elected from the Board; and many others who have contributed their professional expertise and dedicated effort. Working together, we have leveraged about \$130,000 in grants and donations with volunteer labor to accomplish these essential tasks:

Formation of WiredWest Communications Cooperative Corporation, expansion of our membership from 22 to 42 towns, and adoption of policies and procedures governing our operations; Retention of an Executive Director on a contingent-fee basis tied to the success of WiredWest; Development of a GIS database identifying every single utility pole structure (over 70,000 of them), and road in our territory; High -level engineering and cost estimates for building the last-mile network; Development of a comprehensive and dynamic pro forma financial model for construction and operation of the last-mile network; Research and evaluation of potential financing strategies; Study of the regional economic impact of deploying the last mile; Research on the market for and pricing of broadband services such as internet connectivity, digital phone service and video programming; Acquiring signatures on over 12,600 "Support Cards" of people interested in using such services, and building a database of contact information for future sales and marketing efforts; Ongoing outreach to our delegates, town officials, residents and volunteers; Continuing communication of the WiredWest story through traditional and online media; Advocacy with state and federal officials on broadband issues affecting our member towns.

We estimate the value of volunteer work provided to WiredWest thus far to be more than \$1,000,000. Every month going forward about 500 hours of volunteer labor will be contributed to the project on behalf of our member towns in furtherance of our mission of "bringing broadband home."

Under the WiredWest bylaws, upon joining the co-op each town paid a one-time membership fee of \$1,000. Those bylaws also provide that the Board may, if it deems necessary, assess on a year-by-year basis an annual fee from each town of up to \$1,000 to provide operating capital for WiredWest. We did not assess such a fee in our first three fiscal years.

However, in December, the Board voted unanimously to assess a fee of \$1,000 for Fiscal Year 2015, beginning July1, 2014. To keep the project moving forward at this critical time, we require services from legal counsel and other professionals which are vital to the project but for which we must pay. We also have some out-of-pocket expenses, but rest assured that we operate on a very stringent fiscal basis.

WiredWest believes our member towns have received—and will continue to receive—outstanding value for your investment in the initiative. We understand that your town's budget is tight, but the long-term social and economic benefits of the last-mile network to your town and the region will be significant. Can you imagine a bright future for your town and its citizens without 21<sup>st</sup> century broadband service?

## **Pearl Rhodes Elementary School Notes from Technology Class**

Grades 5/6 have been working on creating graphs and charts using Microsoft Excel. We created a graph to track the progress of our keyboarding/typing skills, a graph of our classes' birthdays and spelling tests using formulas to calculate totals and averages. Upcoming classes will include using Microsoft PowerPoint and good digital citizenship. The class has also created a digital journal that they write in periodically.

Grades 3/4 have created a Microsoft Word document using various features of the program such as font styles, headers, headings, text boxes and word art. Students were asked to develop questions they have about the extreme weather condition they are studying in class, and then use the internet to find answers and pictures. Website addresses are then brought into their document to give credit to the source. This was our introduction to copyright issues and tools to narrow Internet searches.

Grades 1/2 just finished typing interesting facts they researched in class into a Microsoft Word document. We are now moving into projects that relate to their ancestors. We are using the paint program to draw pictures of their families and Google Earth to visit the countries where their ancestors came from. Each student printed a picture from the country he or she visited.

Please keep in mind that most of the Web 2.0 tools that we use during class are accessible on the PRES website under Cara's Classes. Cara's Classes can be accessed through each classroom page. Students are encouraged to practice the typing lessons outside of school if possible. The link can be found on Cara's Classes Home page.

#### **PVRSD Preschool Screening**

As part of the federal requirements under the Special Education Law, the school district is required to offer preschool screening to families of young children, ages 3 – 5 years. Preschool screening is a brief look at your child's skills in the areas of speech/language, small and large motor development, and pre-academic skills – knowledge of colors, shapes, counting, and memory. Preschool screening is recommended to parents who have concerns or questions about their child's development.

Preschool screening is not required as part of the preschool application process. All children enrolled in the public school preschool programs are screened within the first 45 days of preschool.

If you are interested in having your child screened on Thursday, May 1st, please contact the Early Childhood Office, 413-498-2660, for an appointment (by appointment only).

## **PVRSD Kindergarten Registration**

If your child is currently enrolled in preschool at PRES, enrollment information will be sent home in our Thursday folder in the next few weeks.

For new Kindergarten students who are not currently attending PRES, registration for the 2014/15 school year will be held May 5 - 16 at Pearl Rhodes between 9:00 AM and 2:30 PM. Please call for an appointment.

In order to pick up a registration packet, you must bring your child's birth certificate to prove age eligibility for kindergarten entry. The age must be 5 years of age by September 1, 2014, and the child must be a resident of the Town or apply for school choice.

Registration materials are due back to the school by Friday, May 23, 2014.
