WiredWest Fiber Optics The new fiscal year for Leyden has arrived and it brings with it many items that were passed at our annual town meeting. The Selectboard has reorganized with Bill Glabach as Chairman. Welcome aboard Lance Fritz, a former board member. The team is now intact with a bundle of agenda items.

The most important task this year is our process of bringing broadband to the residents of Leyden. As stated at town meeting, this has been a long, slow journey. Back in December the Selectboard signed a non-binding resolution to go forward and bring the authorization vote to town for the residents to decide. Leyden residents clearly spoke in favor of continuing this effort with the overwhelming majority of votes to authorize

Can you believe the Leyden Cafeteria has been serving the community at the Franklin County Fair since 1933—82 years!? We still use the same recipes that were used that first year: Clam chowder and beef stew. In addition to the chowder and stew, bakes beans, regular dinners, breakfast and many specials are served.

In the beginning, seats made from horseshoe kegs were on three sides of the booth under a tent. Now everyone comes into the booth, where we have tables and chairs to seat about 70 people at a time. Only through the efforts of many people have we been able to keep our little white church on the hill open.

The fair runs from <u>Thursday, September 9th</u> through <u>Sunday, September 13th</u>. Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be served. The booth has three shifts, and a minimum of 30 people is needed each day. A fair entrance ticket will be given to each person who volunteers for a shift.

This is an opportunity to meet neighbors, have a good time, share your talents and raise much-needed funds for the church. A good percentage of funds will be cycled back into the community through services and projects. OUR GRANT HAS BEEN EXTENDED!

Leyden Residents are still eligible for <u>FREE</u> tick testing. (sorry, no more pet testing). If you have been <u>bitten</u> (the tick <u>was attached to your skin</u>) by a <u>Deer Tick</u>, save the tick in a small, plastic bag.

Log on to <u>www.tickreport.com</u> and follow the instructions for mailing the tick, or call Lisa White, R.N. at 413-665-1400,

Ext. 114 and she will help you through the process.

Data collected over the last year for the 10 towns participating in the testing grant, show that approximately <u>35% of ticks are infected with Lyme disease</u>. Additionally, several more diseases are now associated with tick bites.

Check Those Propane Tanks!

The severe winter caused much of the area to heave as a result of the frost buildup in the ground. Heaving under or around your propane tanks may have caused leaks to occur. *If you smell propane near your tank, call 911 immediately.*

borrowing at the Annual Town Meeting. This past June the Town held a debt exclusion vote that again passed with overwhelming support.

The town is now in the process of attaining its 40% sign-up rate. This will ensure the vital financial commitment to allow for the build-up of fiber throughout the town. This will include state funds that have been secured to ensure quality internet service and infrastructure. The Town will have an investment, along with the other 32 towns participating. As of July 14, 2015, 114 Leyden households have signed up for WiredWest, and we need 30 more households to reach 40%. We firmly expect to exceed the 40% when this project gets up and running. This will have a huge impact on the financial reimbursement back to our community when the system is built.

Recently our board traveled to Cummington for a meeting on WiredWest, and gathered more information as we move this process forward. At Town Meeting, Article 24 passed to establish a broadband committee to be appointed by the Selectboard. Any resident who is interested in being on this committee, please submit your name to Administrative Assistant Bob Hardesty by August 17th. Committee members will be working with our board and WiredWest delegates to advise and assist in the development of high-speed broadband internet service for the town. Currently the Selectboard, along with other towns, is securing a state grant that will help us in the expertise of submitting paper work for the state funding of the last mile of fiber. You can follow your town's progress along with others by going to WiredWest.net.

Highway Department Our highway department got an early start with the paving of Brattleboro Road into Greenfield Road this year. David Brooks has been right out straight with many projects lined up to make your roads as safe as possible. Roadside mowing is taking place; when you see the highway signs out there please be especially cautious to protect our workers on the road. Thank you, David and your entire workforce, for making our roads the best in the county.

Overdue Tax Collection The town continues to actively pursue non-payment of taxes. All departments share the responsibility and time-consuming work to get property that has

been assessed back on the tax rolls for collection. The town recently held its first town-wide auction that resulted in selling a piece of property that is now back on the tax roll after decades of non-payment. Another town-wide auction will be held in September. Check advertisements in local papers and notices on Town Hall for times and dates. As always, call Bob Hardesty who has a list that will be posted shortly. It's the goal of our board to recoup our cost along with additional revenue if possible and ensure that these properties are secured and put back on the tax roll where it helps to make a viable community.

Mohawk Trail Woodlands Partnership Our Selectboard sits on the Mohawk Trail Woodlands Partnership, a plan for forest-based economics development and conservation. A draft is now in place and should be coming to the 20 towns in Franklin and Berkshire Counties to decide on this year. This is a very detailed plan that has been long in the making. It touches all parts of the towns from Chapter 90 money to pilot money that is sent back to our towns from the State. A draft is available in the Selectboard office if you would like to read it. Because of the number of pages, copies will not be left out for the taking, but on request we can furnish you a copy.

Selectboard Meetings The Selectboard meets biweekly. Meeting dates and times are posted at Town Hall, and there's always time allotted for citizens' concerns if you wish to discuss something. If there is a specific issue, please forward your concerns to Bob Hardesty so your topic can be placed on the agenda. This will allow the Selectboard to be briefed and some research done in advance to make it a more productive meeting. This will help to readily resolve your concerns.

Agricultural Commission Vacancies There are two vacancies on the AgCom. If interested, please call Bob Hardesty at the Selectboard office.

Thanks to Barbara Wallace In closing, many thanks go out to Barbara Wallace, our past Chairman, for the hard work and hundreds of hours it takes to keep a town running. The commitment of bringing all financial departments together to make this town operate a little bit better was work well done. It gives us all a better idea of what it takes for better management in such a complex work environment, especially when staffing is part-time and most of the work is done with volunteer time. She surely left your town in better shape and for that we say "Thank You."

WiredWest

Leyden was the very first of 43 hill towns to overwhelmingly vote yes to join WiredWest and get connected to the 21st century.

Leyden was in the top five towns out of 43 hill towns when we were asked to indicate that we understood the importance of fiber to the home.

Now we are falling behind other towns in the effort to get a baseline of 40% of our households signed up. While several other towns have far surpassed 40%, we still need more than 30 households. It is very important that we continue our history of forward thinking by getting our residents to fill out the precommitment form and send in the refundable \$49 for the first month's service. Every one over that 40% helps to ensure that we will see more money returning to our town to cover the cost of the infrastructure. WiredWest and Mass. Broadband are

moving steadily forward in the drive to connect all our homes to the best internet possible. This is the largest, most complex project of its kind in the U.S., so we are literally making history.

I know it's easy to put things on hold over the summer, but it is important that you not put off making your commitment now. It benefits you by ensuring that you will be connected in the first tier at the best price. You will have the best internet available anywhere, with the option of phone and TV service as well. It benefits the town by creating a customer base that returns revenue to the town, not to big corporations that can't wait to get out of serving us at all. LOW COST COMPOST PAILS AND BINS AVAILABLE

Composting is easy, and it can be even easier with effective composting equipment. Attractive, durable "Earth Machine" compost bins are available for purchase at several locations within the Franklin County Solid Waste Management District, and "Sure-Close" kitchen compost collection pails are available at the District Office at 50 Miles St, Greenfield.

Why compost? Composting reduces waste, saves money, slows climate change, and greatly improves soil structure and water retention. Residents can save money by using homemade compost on their gardens and lawns instead of purchasing bagged fertilizers and topsoil. In addition, residents of towns that require "Pay As You Throw" trash bags or stickers can save money by composting rather than filling up town bags with compostable waste.

To make composting as easy as possible, the Solid Waste District Office is selling green "Sure-Close" kitchen compost pails for \$5. This 1.9-gallon pail is meant to sit on the countertop or under the sink to collect compostables before taking them out to the backyard compost bin or municipal compost collection. The Sure-Close lid can be made to stay open for hands-free use when cooking or cleaning up. The pinholes in the tightly locking lid allow moisture to evaporate, which reduces odor.

Municipal compost programs are available free to permit holders at the transfer stations in Leverett, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, and Whately. These food and paper waste collections are different than backyard composting in that a wider range of materials is acceptable, including meat, bones, cheese, peanut butter, oily foods, and paper such as paper towels, napkins, paper plates and compostable cups. Animal products and oily foods should never be put in *home* compost systems.

In addition to the pails available at the District office, 16 District towns recently received varying amounts of kitchen compost pails free as part of MassDEP's Sustainable Materials Recovery Program (SMRP) small-scale initiatives grant: Bernardston, Buckland, Charlemont, Colrain, Conway, Deerfield, Erving, Gill, Heath, Leverett, Leyden, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Shelburne, and Whately.

The Earth Machine compost bin, which the Solid Waste District sells "at cost" for \$45, is made of a tough recycled

polyethylene plastic and has a twist-on locking lid. The bin stakes to the ground and is easy to assemble, is rodent resistant, and features a door in the bottom that can be lifted up to shovel out finished compost.

The Earth Machine compost bin is available for purchase at these four locations: Colrain Transfer Station, open Saturdays 8-4; Wendell Transfer Station, Tues. 12-6, Sat. 7:30-3:30; Orange Transfer Station, Tues., Thurs, & Sat.: 8-2:45; and the District office, 50 Miles Street, Greenfield (hours vary; call 413-772-2438).

District residents may purchase Sure-Close kitchen pails at the District Office only, 50 Miles St., Greenfield; call 413-772-2438 for hours. Cash and checks accepted.

FALL "CLEAN SWEEP" BULKY WASTE COLLECTION

Save the date: Fall "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Day: October 24th from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. The three drop-off sites are: the Buckland Recreation Facility on Rt. 112 South, the Northfield Highway Garage, and the Whately Transfer Station. Bring tires, appliances, scrap metal, mattresses, construction debris, computers and equipment, televisions, propane gas tanks, and other large items. You can also bring clean and dry (bagged) textiles and books for free reuse or recycling.

New: Bring bulky rigid plastics for recycling, such as broken laundry baskets or recycle bins, 5 gallon pails, clean plant pots (no crinkly 6-pack holders), plastic lawn furniture, large kids toys (no batteries) - nothing larger than 4 feet in any direction.



Lazy Days of Summer

As I drive over Brattleboro Road to worship with the precious congregation at the Leyden United Methodist Church each Sunday morning, a variety of wildlife crosses my path. Virtually every trip in my first two months as pastor here included at least one deer sighting. That was exhilarating for me since they hold deeply spiritual meaning. I purchased a Muslim prayer rug when I was exploring the ruins at Ephesus in seminary in 2009. (That's the site of the community called "Ephesians" in the Bible.) This intricately woven, silk work includes two deer at the heavenly gate. Between plying my friends and I with glass after glass of hot, sweet apple tea with two sugar cubes and an impossibly tiny spoon, the Turkish salesman told us that deer symbolize healing and guide one into heaven. In Native American lore I've also learned that in many ancient and indigenous traditions the antlers are a symbol of spiritual authority because they grow above the physical head, reaching towards the realm of spirit. They signify regeneration, because they die and grow back, bigger than before.

My impressions of other animals like rescued turtles, rafters of turkeys and scampering goose families are less profound, but equally enjoyable. I especially delight in the swallows that dart out in front of us as we pass the Franklin Farm, playing and flying upward in a tornado-like swirl beside the cows munching the pink clover blossoms. The red-winged blackbirds that fly by as we pass the marshy area remind me of Robert Pirsig's cross-country journey with his 11-year-old son in Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance, when he says, "at age eleven you don't get very impressed with red-winged blackbirds." It seems that is true at age 17 too since my son isn't nearly as filled with glee as I am at seeing the wings of these spectacular fowl ablaze with color.

When a loon surfaced ten feet off the bow of my kayak during our recent vacation, my son did sit up and take notice and when it sang its mournful song so close we could see its throat vibrate, both of us were in awe. He seemed pretty impressed with the mink that snuck up behind an unsuspecting frog, making it lunch before rejoining its family that day, as well.

Summer is the perfect time to slow life down to notice all of the little things that whiz by during our busy lives, things that are always going on but just beyond our view. In summer, the windows are open so we can smell the fresh cut grass, as well as the pungent skunks. There are days when the sky couldn't be any bluer. We fall asleep to the sweet sounds of crickets and sights of fireflies, damp from the day's humidity, only to wake and pull on another blanket when the morning's brisk air chills our toes. There is so much more than roses to stop and smell. In fact, that may just be our reason for being, to enjoy this beautiful creation, not in some far off future, but now, along the way.

In Chapter 17 of the wonderful classic that is lingering once more on my Audible playlist, Pirsig writes, "Mountains should be climbed with as little effort as possible and without desire. ... [W]hen you are no longer thinking ahead, each footstep isn't just a means to an end but a unique event in itself. ... To live only for some future goal is shallow. It's the sides of the mountain that sustain life, not the top. Here's where things grow."

Enjoy these lazy days of summer: take time to notice the skunks as well as the grass growing sweetly on the sides of your life's mountain.
