munity Service Program completed the painting of the town office building. They did a terrific job patching many holes, fixing minor broken fixtures and repainted every room. The former school is bright and clean. We thank everyone for putting up with the disruption and putting their offices back together. The future of the building as a gathering for meetings, office space and other possible uses will be a true asset for the town.

The Selectboard along with Nicole Glabach, Town Clerk, will be holding our Town Caucus on March 16th at 7:00pm upstairs in the Town Hall. After the caucus the positions will be advertised for elections to be held at our Annual Town Meeting on May 16th.

We thank Karin Parks for hosting Senator Jo Comerford on February 8th as she toured Libraries around Franklin County. The dining hall was filled with town residents as the Senator gave an overview of her first year in office. It was good to listen to how our state government is performing and the impact she has made during her first year. She opened the floor to questions. We again mentioned the impact the rising cost of the PVRSD and how the increases each year are unsustainable.

At the recent PVRSD budget public hearing we expressed concern at another large increase in our assessment for 2021. At a recent School Committee meeting they voted the budget as presented and then increased it by bringing back an adjustment counselor. With Warwick Elementary school targeted to close we hope they sharpen their pencils a little bit better before town meetings. The budget approved did not include any savings from the closure.




Knitting Circle

Climate Corner

Omnivore? Vegetarian? A recent conversation with my daughter about food sources around the world reminded me once again that, in our culture, most of us have many food choices. What could be more personal than what we choose to put inside our bodies? Yet here, too, those choices affect others around us, even on the grand scale of climate. And, like so many other aspects acting on our concerns about climate, it's complicated.

According to Project Drawdown moving to a plant-rich diet is among the top five actions, in terms of cost benefit calculations, that we can take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Notice that the action calls for a reduction in our reliance on animal protein, not an elimination. Elimination is certainly not feasible in many parts of the world and unlikely for many others. Livestock-cattle, sheep, pigs, chickens-and their products occupy a large role in many Americans' diets. While we are advised that eating less meat should be a goal of the health conscious individual, it is also better for the climate, overall. Here's where the complicated part arises. Because ... it is also true that among the top approaches to reducing greenhouse gases are regenerative agriculture practices, farmland restoration and silvopasturing, all of which can be undertaken while farming livestock.

Grazing livestock can also provide climate positive effects aside from such practices. Fifty percent more carbon is stored in grasslands across the planet than in forests. Conservation of grasslands and the attendant grazing contributes to biodiversity of plant species, helps promote seed dispersal and provides food sources for pollinators. Additionally, livestock often utilize land that is unsuitable for other crops. In Leyden we are fortunate to have local sources of pork, lamb, chicken and dairy products. Eating locally grown foods should be factored into any calculus of one's carbon footprint.

The production and consumption of food will play a large role in our collective approach to reducing carbon emissions. That is why Project Drawdown also lists silvopasturing, regenerative agriculture and farmland restoration among the top approaches capable of reducing greenhouse gases. Look for more on these topics in future columns. That is because we have choices and there's often more to the story.



A raccoon that was found on Coates Road in early February tested positive for rabies.

If you suspect a raccoon is rabid, *stay far away from it and call Shelburne Control Police (413-625-8200) for help. DO NOT attempt to take care of it by yourself.* Raccoons can transmit rabies to all other mammals, including humans.

In some states, raccoons are classified as a rabies vector species (RVS), which means they can carry and transmit diseases. Any mammal can do that, but raccoons are at a higher risk. *Make sure that all your pets are up to date with their rabies vaccines.*

How to Tell If a Raccoon Is Rabid

Here are five typical signs of a rabid raccoon:

- Appears to look sick- raccoons can contract a variety of diseases, but you should not risk coming into contact with a sick raccoon.
- Foaming at the mouth – One of the most well-known symptoms of rabies. If you spot this, be sure to keep your distance.
- Making strange noises – most raccoons make noises, but a sick raccoon will make uncommon noises.
- Looks confused, disoriented, and slow – a healthy raccoon will look busy as they are very active and intelligent.
- Difficulty walking – Paralysis in the legs is often a symptom of rabies.

Help Make Sure Everyone Counts in Our Community Coming Soon! The 2020 U.S. Census is safe, easy and important.

Every 10 years, the U.S. Census counts every person living in the U.S.A. In mid-March every household in town will get an invitation to complete the 2020 U.S. Census. Most households will receive this by mail, some will have it hand-delivered. If no one from the household responds by mid-April, you will be mailed a paper copy of the questionnaire to complete and mail back. If there is no response by late April, an official Census-taker may visit the household to complete the questionnaire in person.

The questionnaire is short and takes just a few minutes to complete. The information gathered in the U.S. Census is safe and confidential. Only names and birth dates are collected, no one will be asked for Social Security numbers or bank or credit card information.

The U.S. Census impacts our community in two main ways: representation and money. The population count will be used to determine political representation at the state and national level. The count also helps determine how much federal and state money comes to our community to help pay for education, roads, transportation, housing, health care, and more. If we don't get an accurate count, our community will not receive the money needed to pay for crucial services each year for the next ten years!




