Select Board Report

Dog days of summer have come with hot sun and little rain and might just be with us until September. The Town Office is air conditioned and even when there is not a heat advisory come by and cool off. There is room for you to bring a project, and the Wi-Fi connection is great. You may run into a neighbor or someone in town you don't know yet. This could be the beginning of turning the Town Office into a community center.

Thanks to the 31 citizens that turned out for the **Special Town Meeting** on July 16th. Despite the heat in the Town Hall, **all nine articles** were discussed – thoroughly and vigorously – and **were approved**. Thanks to Jack Golden, Town Moderator, for his facilitation of the meeting in which many motions had amendments plus added friendly amendments. Eight of the nine articles were submitted by the Planning Board and represent changes and additions to Leyden's Zoning Bylaws. These will now be sent to the Attorney General for approval.

The Select Board met with Gary Ponce of **Colrain Volunteer Ambulance Service, Inc.** and he reported that there were **33 calls for this past year**, one call had only basic life support personnel and needed a paramedic level. Most of our calls have been for falls and they would like to start a falls risk assessment program so people can help themselves, reducing the need to call the ambulance. The Select Board signed a new contract to begin August 7th for one year. The payment will be once per year based on an assessment of 35 calls, an average of two years of actual calls, at a rate of \$330 a call.

Health Alert from the Board of Health

The Pioneer Valley Mosquito Control District has alerted the Board of Health that a pool of mosquitoes have tested positive for West Nile virus in Leyden. The mosquitoes were trapped down by Avery Field and the Pavilion. Please take precautions when outside. Populations most sensitive to the severe symptoms of WNV are older people and those with certain medical conditions. Most people do not develop any symptoms. But if you do, symptoms can range from fever, body aches, joint pain, vomiting, diarrhea to encephalitis and meningitis. Please alert your medical professional if you have symptoms.

Avoid being outside early in the morning or later at night. Wear an ageappropriate insect repellent. Wear long sleeves and long pants. Repair any screens in your house. Empty any containers in your yard with water.

The Massachusetts Fair Share supplemental budget includes \$100,000 for capital improvements for Pioneer Valley Regional School District (PVRSD). The district hopes to use the **\$100,000** to build an **outdoor learning pavilion** at Pioneer Valley Regional School. The school was recently designated by the state for an Environmental Education Career Innovation Pathway, and Pioneer students would construct the pavilion as part of their environmental studies. Any thoughts you have about using the money for this project should be shared with the PVRSD School Committee chair Melissa Gerry gerrym@pvrsdk12.org.

Thanks to the persistent efforts of our Town Treasurer, Susan Bobe, the outstanding property taxes have been reduced from \$100,000 to \$42,000. Be aware that there are fees charged for late payments of taxes and after the second letter of request, those delinquent property owners will be posted on the town website and buildings. The motor vehicle outstanding excise tax is currently \$5,067. There are late fees also for these taxes and they go up quickly as months pass without payment. Taxes are essential to Leyden as they are our primary source of revenue, so prompt payment keeps us financially sound. Payment options can be worked out with the Town Treasurer.

Katherine DiMatteo, the Mayor of Greenfield, Ginny Desrocher, and Lisa Limont walked the **Leyden Glen** – Greenfield's Reservoir to bring to the Mayor's attention that many Leyden and Greenfield residents walk the trails and **recently No Trespassing signs are being enforced**. We would like to keep those trails open for those who use them respectfully and await a response from Greenfield.

Announcements:

- We received the \$10,500 Fire Fighter grant and the reimbursement payment.
- Bill Brooks will be on vacation the week of 8/4 through 8/7
- The accessible walking path at Avery Field connecting the pavilion to the pickleball courts is finished. Check it out! Thanks to the Highway Department for their work. This project was funded by the Mass in Motion grant.
- On July 18 the FRCOG traveled throughout Franklin County to show interns and residents who will be working at Franklin Medical Center what our county looks like. Katherine DiMatteo introduced them to Leyden on their way through.
- An **orientation for new appointees and elected officials** is scheduled for September 16th. More information to come but there will be food and beverages.
- The Town Clerk is seeking submissions of **photos for the Town Report**. Show off your photography skills and submit by September 15.
- Year-end transfers from accounts underspent to accounts overspent during fiscal year 2025 were approved by the Select Board and Finance Committee.
- The Select Board sent a **letter of support to the Town of Oakham** asking the MA Energy Facility Siting Board to reconsider their location for a large battery storage facility along the Ware River. Oakham residents voted against the project, but the state is overriding the town's decision.

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Fire Department

Hello from the Leyden Fire Department!

In the past several months, Leyden Fire has lost the three youngest members of our department related to moves out of town.

We were a crew of eight, now down to five.

This is a hard loss.

At the same time, it is positive and necessary for young people to step into new work, adventures, and independence. These are members of our family, Ernie Royer, Caleb Howard, and Timothy Howard, and we send them off with the full strength of our best wishes, and the hope that our service together has made them stronger, more resilient, and an asset to every community they encounter.

We are grateful for their service.

We are now recruiting with more urgency.

If you, or someone you know, have ever considered the fire service as a way to get involved and serve your community, please reach out for a conversation.

More importantly, and I speak from experience on this: There are likely some people in our community who have never imagined they could be firefighters, and they might really like it.

Here are some details so you know a bit more about being a firefighter in Leyden.

We meet regularly, on Tuesday evenings at 6 p.m., to train, and maintain the station, trucks, and gear.

We respond to medical calls, fires, downed wires, and other emergencies.

Training is something that every firefighter is always doing. It involves both theory and practice.

We learn how pumps, hoses and fittings work, how to drive big trucks, how incident command structures work, breathing with an air tank, taking a blood pressure, putting out different kinds of fires, and health and safety in every situation.

There are opportunities to learn both how to take orders and be a useful member of a team, and to learn how to prioritize and lead.

We learn both that we need to be strong and useful, and we have to take care of each other.

Whether a beginner or years in, there are always new things to learn.

New recruits are invited and supported to try everything, but not expected to do anything they are not ready to do.

No one can respond to every call; we all have families, jobs, and real lives.

Perhaps the most important metric here is that the more members there are, the lighter the load we all carry.

Our current department is more than 50 percent female.

Being a member of a Fire Department is great motivation for improving physical fitness and taking care of your mental health.

Our neighbors in Leyden need and deserve a well-staffed Fire Department.


On the morning of Sunday, September 28, 2025, the Heart of Leyden road race will be starting from Avery Field.

Board of Health

The Board of Health will be subsidizing a CPR class and a Basic First Aid class in October and November.

Food Resources

Food insecurity is where individuals or households lack reliable access to enough safe and nutritious food to meet their dietary needs and preferences for an active and healthy life. It's something we should all be thinking of because it can affect anyone at anytime in different ways.

While issues of food and nutrition may be highly personal, they remain a public health issue. What we eat and where we source it from is ultimately a community concern. This is particularly true in small, aging communities like ours. The Leyden Board of Health urges folks to reach out for resources and support. Whatever your level of food insecurity may be, the BOH wants our residents to know that healthy, affordable food is available locally for everyone. Eating local is good for our farmers and good for us.

The Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) is a program in Mass that gives people in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) access to fresh local food for free. HIP helps a person buy more locally grown fruits and vegetables. When you buy fruits and vegetables with SNAP benefits at participating farmers' markets, mobile markets, farm stands or Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) farm share programs, you earn extra money on your SNAP/EBT card.

Effective July 1, 2025, HIP benefits have increased to \$40/month for all households.

This means that SNAP dollars spent on eligible fruits and vegetables will earn HIP up to a maximum monthly benefit of \$40 regardless of household size. To earn HIP, you must buy from participating farms (you cannot earn HIP by shopping at a grocery store) and spend SNAP on fruits and vegetables. The benefit is added directly back to your SNAP/EBT card and can be used towards any future SNAP eligible purchase.

You can check the Community Involved in Sustaining Agriculture (CISA) HIP map which shows all the places where SNAP recipients can use their HIP benefits locally: www.buylocalfood.org. For example, these benefits can be used at Just Roots in Greenfield (justroots.org) and the Guilford Food Hub (neighborhoodroots.org).

In addition to accepting SNAP and HIP, Just Roots' Farm to Family program provides CSA shares year-round to food insecure MassHealth patients across the state in collaboration with healthcare partners. Patients are referred to Farm to Family through their participating healthcare provider and receive home deliveries of fresh local produce and proteins, cookware, and nutrition supports.

The Guilford Food Hub also supports local farmers and helps make local food convenient and affordable for everyone. Food is sold at or below cost. If you are a SNAP/EBT customer, you'll get a 50% discount on all produce. There is also a pay-what-youwant food shelf open to the community on pickup days.



Climate Corner: A Summer Reading List

Most summer reading lists don't arrive when summer is on the wane, but this one requires no immediacy of response. These three books have been sitting in that proverbial pile on the bedside table, untouched for months. Recently my personal reading refuge has become mystery fiction, punctuated by nonfiction magazine articles. Today, after reading an article entitled, "Earth's Turbulent Eons of Climate Change," by Elise Cutts, I decided that three in that pile will be next. (www.sciencenews.org/article/climate-change-history-earth - warming) Here are my personal responses/short excerpts.

Human Nature: Nine Ways to Feel About Our Changing Planet, by Kate Marvel

Kate, a PhD climate scientist, asks and answers in her introduction, "I feel so much...Isn't this unscientific? Aren't researchers supposed to be perfectly objective, unemotional, and neutral about the world we study? I can't be...I need to declare a conflict of interest regarding Earth: Everyone I love lives here." After the introduction, she offers approaches to how we feel about climate change in nine chapters: wonder, anger, guilt, fear, grief, surprise, pride, hope, and love.

The Parrot and the Igloo, by David Lipsky

In his preface the author describes the structure of his book, written in three parts, and suggests you read them in the order that interests you most. He states "The story this book tells is about people who *made* our world; then the people who *realized* there might be a problem; then the people who *lied* about that problem." I've started the first chapter which introduced me into the fascinating link between a particular technology and its long impacts.

The Panda's Thumb, by Stephen Jay Gould

A high school friend sent me the Folio Society edition of this book at holiday time. I had read it and virtually all of his books after I heard him speak at a special meeting of the American Society of Zoologists in the early 1980s centered on evolution. From then on I was hooked. I had used his essay, "Sex, Drugs, Disasters and the Extinction of the Dinosaurs," as a reading assignment for my Biology students, hoping the title would lead them to the objective of the piece: what makes a testable hypothesis and what does not. The title contains the hint to the nature of these three hypotheses. I must have heard Dr. Gould speak at least six times. The last time was in 1993 in Boston when I approached the podium, and asked him to sign his essay, "The Median is not the Message." He did so and added, "Welcome to the largest involuntary club in the world." He meant cancer; he was in remission and saw that I was wearing a hat to cover my then bald head. That essay had given me hope in a dark time. In his homage to Gould in the Folio edition of this book, Stephen Brussante says, "he didn't write like a scientist. He name-dropped philosophers, drew analogies from music, literature, and always wove history and culture into his narratives, all without being too haughty for a kid from farm country to embrace." And, yes, baseball, his passion.

Whatever your reading choices, know that there is good non-fiction out there, too.
